The landowner has known of its existence for at least fifteen years, and is providing 100% cooperation in its protection. Therefore, only harm could result from reporting the location to any organization which might want to set up a sanctuary, with the accompanying publicity resulting in a flood of curiosity seekers. Disclosure of the

Ivory-bill's existence, but not its exact location, has been made to Whitney Eastman, who has been the "clearing house" for Ivory-bill reportings for many years. We showed the area to Paul Sykes, Endangered Species representative of the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, upon two occasions without seeing the bird.
